THEME

DISORDER AND ORDER: A STUDY OF ENTROPY AND A STUDY OF EVIL

While both science and religion have assumed that events are a part of a cosmic order that is potentially knowable, they both also acknowledge that there are disordering processes in the world. In science this is exemplified by the second law of thermodynamics, involving the concept of entropy. In religions the experience of disorder has been expressed through myths and symbols of evil.

It is the purpose of this conference to examine critically, in a crossdisciplinary manner, conceptualizations of order and disorder with the goal of exploring possible syntheses between the domains of science and religion.

What new light does recent study of symbolism and mythology shed on the problem of evil in the religious imagination and understanding?

Is order always good and disorder always bad?

Have the contemporary scientific concepts of entropy and the second law anything to offer to religious understandings of evil?

Have the religious symbols of evil anything to offer to our interpretations of entropy and the second law?

Have the religious symbols of evil and the contemporary concepts of entropy anything to say about our understanding of the world and our human condition?
