FREE WILL: IS IT POSSIBLE AND IS IT DESIRABLE?

The question of whether a human individual can exert any significant influence over things that matter regarding the course of his or her life has sparked some of the most interesting intellectual debates in the history of human thought. Today's scientific and culturally pluralistic age presents some serious tensions in human thinking concerning free will, or self-determination: scientists seek to explain completely all events, including human actions, in terms of antecedent conditions even as they pursue freedom of scientific inquiry; many theologians argue that God is all powerful, even to the point of contravening what are accepted as divinely established laws of nature, while others argue that humans freely decide whether to follow nature's laws or God's will; and many people are committed to individual liberty of thought and action, even though others willingly submit to control by religious, political, and economic forces.

In this conference the Institute on Religion in an Age of Science seeks to bring to bear contemporary natural and social scientific knowledge as well as historical and contemporary philosophical and theological insights on questions concerning the possibility and desirability of free will. Questions include: (1) What are the historical and contemporary meanings of terms such as *free will*, *freedom*, *self-determination*, and *determinism*? Are some terms more useful today than others? (2) To what extent is it possible for a person to make his or her own decisions? (3) What role, if any, does freedom or something like freedom play in the evolution or creation of the universe, and what are the consequences for evolution, if any, of the exercise of free will? (4) In what circumstances and to what extent is free will desirable and undesirable for the individual and society? (5) Under what conditions do people relinquish or assert the exercise of free will or self-determination?

SPEAKERS INCLUDE: BRIAN CALVERT, early western philosophy, University of Guelph; JERRE LEVY, biopsychology, University of Chicago; Roy D. MORRISON II, philosophy of religion and science, Wesley Theological Seminary; Louis Pojman, moral philosophy, University of Mississippi; MICHAEL RUSE (paper coauthored by Edward O. Wilson), philosophy of biology, University of Guelph; Robert C. Sorensen, sociology and marketing, Rider College; and Robert Wilken, history of Christian and Jewish thought, University of Virginia.

Other fields are expected to include physics, psychiatry, law, economics, politics, advertising, and consumer behavior.
