STAR ISLAND in the ISLES OF SHOALS, Off PORTSMOUTH, NEW HAMPSHIRE

DESCRIPTION: Today our society as a whole and the individuals within it are experiencing fundamental change and uncertainty in the pattern of roles and relationships of men and women. Sometimes this turmoil is experienced as liberating breakthroughs in self-fulfillment and social reconstruction. At other times the experience is that of confusion, dislocation, violence, and both personal and social disintegration. No one is untouched by these events.

This conference suggests that the phenomenon of gender is a fundamental component of what we are experiencing. It proceeds on the assumption that, if we gain a deeper understanding (1) of what gender is and has been, (2) of what the function and meaning of gender are, and (3) of the reality and effects of gender bias, and if we focus on gender issues from the perspectives of religion and science, we can contribute significantly to our understanding of the current turmoil and lay the foundations for new and wholesome patterns of relationships between women and men.

Areas of exploration, each considered from scientific and religious perspectives, will include: societal roles; family; concepts of the self, world, and God; and evolutionary studies from neurobiology and cultural anthropology.
